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Community Vaccination Center Information

If you have an **Official Appointment or Invitation to the Community Vaccination Center (CVC)** located at the former Gander Mountain store in Woodbridge, here are a few guidelines to follow:

- Do not arrive more than 15 minutes before your appointment. You will not be allowed in early to receive your vaccine.
- No walk-ins are accepted at this time.
- Please pre-register to be contacted for an appointment.
- Please have a **copy of your invitation (email, text, barcode) or other proof of your name** ready when you arrive at the site.

The CVC is using the Pfizer vaccine and is located at the former **Gander Mountain** store, [14011 Worth Avenue, Woodbridge, VA 22192](#). Individuals who receive their Pfizer vaccinations there are coming from the state's pre-registration list and either live or work in Prince William County, Manassas City, or Manassas Park.

To pre-register go to vaccinate.virginia.gov or call **1-877-VAX-IN-VA**. If you have already pre-registered, you need to go to vaccinate.virginia.gov to make sure your information is correct.

COVID-19 VACCINES ARE FREE – DON'T BE SCAMMED!

Scammers wasted no time cashing in on the COVID-19 vaccines and are targeting individuals 65 years and older since the vaccines first rolled out in December. Although they are targeting this age group, they will not hesitate to request payment from those in other age ranges.

Here is what you need to know -- COVID-19 VACCINES ARE FREE

- The Virginia Department of Health (VDH) will not ask for money for a COVID-19 vaccine and will not send you the vaccine through the mail.
- If you are asked to pay for the vaccine or asked to pay to get registered on the waitlist, this is a scam.
- If you receive an email invitation for an appointment but it demands money, this is a scam.
- If you get an advertisement by email, online, or text that says for payment you can get vaccine doses shipped to you, this is a scam.
- Do not take a selfie with your vaccination card and post it to social media. Your vaccination card has personal information on it, like your birth date, which is an invitation for identity theft.

AVOID COVID-19 Vaccine Scams

As COVID-19 vaccine distribution begins, here are signs of potential scams:

- You are asked to pay out of pocket to get the vaccine.
- You are asked to pay to put your name on a vaccine waiting list or to get early access.
- Advertisements for vaccines through social media platforms, email, telephone calls, online, or from unsolicited/unknown sources.
- Marketers offering to sell or ship doses of the vaccine for payment.

✓ **Protect Yourself. Do not give out your personal information to unknown sources.**
